## Graduation Requirements

- Students must take and pass $\mathbf{2 3}$ classes to graduate in Ga. These credits must be earned in specific subject areas.
- $\mathbf{4}$ credits in English
- 4 credits in Math

4 credits in Science

- 3 credits in Social Studies

- 1 Personal Fitness and Health or 3 credits in JROTC
- 3 credits in CTAE/Fine Arts/World Language
- 4 Electives
- Credits are earned when students pass a course with a 70 or higher. Each block course is worth 1 credit.
- For each 9 -week course taken and passed a 5 credit is awarded.

What is a Transcript?

- A transcript is an official document that all high schools in the United States use and records high school courses taken
- This includes all courses passed and failed, even electives!
- This documents is used to send to colleges, trade schools, military, and some employers after you graduate high school.
- This document will follow you even if you move to another school or state


## Promotion to Next Grade Level

For students to be promoted to the next grade level, they must earn a certain number of credits to be promoted to the next grade level.

- 5 credits to be a sophomore

11 credits to be a junior

- 17 credits to be a senior



## High School Schedules

- In high school, you will be on a block schedule. This means you will take $\mathbf{4}$ classes in the Fall (Aug - Dec) and will take 4 new classes in the : Spring (Jan - May).
- Block courses are 90-minutes in length.
- Each semester you will have 2 core courses, and 2 elective courses
- Most 9th Graders take: Biology, World Geography, 9th Lit./Comp and Algebra.

## How Do I Choose My Classes?

In high school, you will get to choose some of your classes, like your electives, but you may not always get the ones you wanted.

- Some courses are required to graduate, and you will not get to choose these courses such as Math, English, Science, and Social Studies.
- Choose electives based on your goals/plans after high school, and not what other students want or tell you to choose.
- You may change your pathway selection after each school year, but remember, if you choose an elective, and get the elective, you must take the class the entire semester!


## How Do I Choose My Classes?



You will begin choosing your classes for high school soon! You will work with your teachers, counselors, and parents on choosing the right courses for you.


Interested in taking an honorslevel class when you get to high school? Start talking to your teachers now about expectations and improvements to be recommended for these courses.


Your counselor will be sending elective and core selection information to your parents in the coming weeks.

- Students have the opportunity to take Honors and/or Advanced Placement (AP) courses during high school. These courses are more rigorous. The content is more difficult, higher expectations, more homework, and are faster paced.
- Students who take an honors course and pass the class with a $\mathbf{7 0}$ or higher earn $\underline{5}$ additional bonus points.
- Students who take an AP course and pass the class with a 70 or higher, earn 10 additional bonus points.
- Teachers must recommend students for Honors and AP Courses. If you want to take an Honors or AP and were not recommended, you may ask for a course waiver.
- The only AP course a student may take as a freshman is AP Human Geography (Social Studies elective course)
- You will hear the term "pathways" many times over the next four years in high school.
- A pathway is when a student completes and passes all 3 classes in a pathway area. Students who do this and pass the end of pathway exam, will receive a cord to wear at graduation.
- Pathways are highly encouraged to complete, but NOT a graduation requirement.

Students who complete a pathway will also receive a seal for their diploma

- Some examples of pathways are Art, Band, Chorus, JROTC, Business, Marketing, Cosmetology, Construction, and many more!


## Do I have to take PE?



- Yes, students must take both Personal Fitness and Health to meet graduation requirements.
- Students may earn 3 credits in JROTC and meet the Health and Personal Fitness requirement.
- Students may not substitute Team Sports or Weight Training for Health and Personal Fitness.


## Do I have to take a lWorld Language to Graduate?

NO! Students may earn 3 credits in a CTAE or Fine Arts course and meet this area for graduation requirements.

BUT......
If you plan on attending a 4-year college after high school, you will need to earn 2 credits, in the same foreign language for acceptance into most 4-year colleges.


## Sports in Highschool

- Students are offered the opportunity to play a sport in high school. Each high school has various sports students must try out for. Be sure to contact the head coach of each sport and ask about conditioning and tryout information.
- Did you know...
- To play sports in high school students must earn $\mathbf{2 . 5}$ credits each semester to be eligible to play. This is a GHSA guideline that is followed by all GA high schools.

Also, students must be on-track to graduate and in their cohort grade level

## Clubs)Activities

- Getting involved in clubs and school activities are important for a few reasons.

1. Connects students with other students of same interest
2. Builds a stronger community
3. Opportunity for additional scholarships after high school
4. May be needed for college applications to make your application stronger.
5. May lead you to new opportunities.

## HOPE Scholarship

- You will be hearing your high school counselors talk a lot about the HOPE scholarship, and it's very important for you to know what this is.
- This program is for students who plan on attending a two- or four-year college, in Georgia, after high school and helps pay for your college classes after you graduate high school.
- HOPE GPA includes your core and world language courses only (English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and World Language)
- It may seem early to plan for college, but HOPE GPA starts building during 9th grade! $^{2}$. To be eligible for the HOPE GPA students must:

1. Graduate from high school
2. Have a 3.0 HOPE GPA (different than you high school GPA).
3. Take 4 rigor classes during high school

## What is an EOC?

- EOC's are end of course assessments that will count for $20 \%$ of a student's final grade.
- Courses with EOC's are Algebra I, Biology, American Literature, and US History
- Some $8^{\text {th }}$ grade students are currently taking Algebra I and you will take the EOC next semester (this will count for 20\% of your final grade just like a high school course). Talk with your teacher if you have further questions.
- EOC's cannot be exempted and are state mandated tests.
